Five Games that Changed High School Football in Alberta

In 1895 the first ever football game was played in Western Canada between the towns of Fort Saskatchewan and Strathcona in what was to become the Province of Alberta. It's not known the level of football that was played that day but it wasn't until 1912 when a true high school league was established in Calgary with Mount Royal College being the first champion. In 1922 Edmonton followed with a five team league with the schools of Victoria, Strathcona, Eastwood, Westglen, and St. Josephs competing. Today over 120 high schools across the province now offer football as a part of their athletic program with the biggest recent growth coming at the 6-man and 9-man levels.

The sport of football at the high school level in Alberta has slowly evolved over the years to become a powerful force in high school athletics across the province but it wasn't until 1985 that a proposal to develop high school football provincials came to be. Even then it wasn't easy to get the ball rolling. Not every league bought into the idea initially and the weather was a big factor early on, but here are five games that changed the face of football at the high school level forever:

1) November 9, 1985: Harry Ainlay Titans 25 Wetaskiwin Sabres 6

A sparse gathering at old Clarke Stadium in Edmonton witnessed the first ever Provincial Tier I playoff game between the champions of the Edmonton and Central Alberta Leagues. Lead by future Calgary Stampeder linebacker Mark Singer, the Titans outlasted the Sabres lead by quarter-back Dan Gusdal. A week later the Titans were scheduled to meet the L.C.I. Rams in the first ever Provincial Championship Game but severe cold caused then ASAA Football Commissioner Larry Wilson to call off the finals and declare co-champions. This could have been the end of the line for Football Provincials through the ASAA, but Commissioner Wilson pressed on and next year saw the event played to completion with a thriller of a Tier I final between the Salisbury Sabres and L.C.I. Rams that saw the Sabres break a 15-15 tie on a fumble return for a touchdown late in the game to eventually win 23-15 as the highlight game.

2) November 17, 1990: L.C.I. Rams 44 St. Francis Browns 0

Provincials were 5 years old before Calgary finally entered a team. The Rams had won the previous two Provincial Tier I titles but conventional wisdom had it that without representation from Calgary or the Edmonton Public League (which had pulled out two years earlier) it really was a title in paper only. Kaboom! In the Provincial Tier I semi-final, with the Sportsplex Field in Lethbridge packed the home town Rams - lead by linebacker Brett Walters - blew apart the myth of big city superiority in a game that would see the Rams outgain the Browns on offence 595-96 and only see the Browns cross mid-field twice in the game. Calgary would get their revenge a year later with the Henry Wise Wood Warriors beating the Rams in Calgary in the semi-final then capturing the Provincial Title a week later with a 36-0 thrashing of Archbishop O'Leary. However, the damage had been done as no longer could the big city schools pretend that Provincials didn't matter and simply claim superiority by their location. There was competition for them beyond their borders and on more than a few occasions in the future it would be too much for them to handle.



3) November 22, 1997: Raymond Comets 39 St. Albert Storm 0

Oh yes we can! The Comets ascent into Tier I was a remarkable thing to watch as this tiny school of 250 after having won three straight Tier III titles from 1992-94 moved up to compete with the big schools starting in 1995. It only took two seasons before they won their first Tier I Championship in 1996. In 1997 they reached the final again and faced the powerful St. Albert Storm that drew athletes from three high schools totaling a population more than ten times that of Raymond's. St. Albert was undefeated, had won the Edmonton Metro League going away, and the previous week has easily defeated the Edmonton Public Champion Parkland Predators. This would be the Comets comeuppance as many observers considered their 1996 win a fluke in a down year for high school football and they would get blown away by the Storm. It was a blowout all right as brothers Brett and Brock Ralph, who would both go on to play in the CFL, lead the Comets to a total domination of the larger squad and the legend of Raymond was born proving that any school that puts their mind to it can accomplish great things.

4) November 16, 2002: Bev Facey Falcons 13 Strathcona Lords 10

Things weren't going well for the Edmonton Metro Tier I teams in Provincials. After the Edmonton Public's re-entry into the Provincials in 1997 the Metro managed to win the first two clashes between leagues in the Northern Tier I Finals but it had been all Public since 1999 and the margins of victory were getting bigger. Coming into the 2002 Northern Final the expectations weren't much better for the Metro's rep - the Bev Facey Falcons - as they were taking on the two time defending Tier I Provincial Champion Strathcona Lords. What unfolded was the first true upset for the ages in Alberta high school football provincials as the Lords star runningback Tyler O'Gorman broke open a tight game late in the fourth quarter on a 74 yard TD run only to see Falcons quarterback Brendan Maher lead Bev Facey right back down the field for the last second touchdown that secured the victory and raised the media profile of Provincials in the Edmonton area and the province for years to come. The Falcons would go on to defeat the L.C.I. Rams the following weekend to complete the dream season.

5) November 24, 2007 Sylvan Lake Lakers 35 Drumheller Titans 14

It wasn't so much the score or the level of play but what this game represented. The 2007 ASAA Provincial Tier IV championship featured two schools that were born during the Provincials era. What they represented was the success of the game in growing to all parts of the province. In 1985 high school football was mainly a big city sport save for a cluster of teams in Central Alberta, the Peace Country and the South. The concept of "tiering" which was formalized in 1989 and reshuffled in 1999 which created levels of play in Provincials based on school size, has allowed the growth of the sport in the smaller schools to go like gangbusters. Prior to that there would have been little reason for schools like H.J. Cody in Sylvan Lake or Drumheller High School to even consider creating a team as all that was waiting for them was a regular season full of games vs. bigger schools. In going from 60 teams in 1985 to 120 this season high school football is alive and well and has the ASAA and High School Provincials to thank for it.

TIER I Provincial Final #3 St. Francis Browns vs. #1 Bev Facey Falcons

Sat., Nov. 26 – 6:00 p.m., Hellard Field at Shouldice Park (Calgary)

Well this is awkward. The current #1 ranked team in the Province vs. the team that started the season with the #1 designation and carried it for most of the season. The good news is that both teams now have a chance to solidify that claim on the field this Saturday. It will be interesting to see how both teams respond as they have taken very different paths to this point. The Falcons have cruised to this point. The only time they have trailed this season was during the first quarter in the North Final vs. Red Deer's Notre Dame. And it wasn't for long as they rang up a similar margin of victory as they have against all comers with no one coming within three TD's of them by games end – including four teams ranked in the Top 10. The Browns on the other hand were cruising along at a similar pace until Oct. 21 when they were upset by the Henry Wise Wood Warriors 28-16. Since then they've been in dogfights, including last Saturday's come from behind win over the Raymond Comets where they trailed 18-13 going into the fourth quarter before pulling it out 29-18.

Another interesting point in this game is fate of Chuba Hubbard. The star tailback for the Falcons, and future Oklahoma State Cowboy, now sits with 2,095 yards and 24 TD's rushing on the season. This is amazing in itself, but despite all the success he is missing one thing on his resume – a Provincial Championship. Despite being an overwhelming force since Pee-Wee he has always run into a brick wall at Provincial Finals. In 2013 while a Pee-Wee, despite scoring 8 TD's in the Provincial Final, his Sherwood Park Sabrecats still dropped the game 78-60 to the Calgary Cowboys. Two years later in a lower scoring affair, Chuba's Sherwood Park Rams lost the Provincial Bantam Final to...(wait for it)...the bantam version of the Calgary Cowboys 25-16. Take a wild guess where most of those Calgary Cowboys wound up going to high school? Yes, Chuba has seen the names Joe Dutton, Jacob Izquiredo, etc. before, and while the Browns player's shelves are dripping with Provincial Title gold medals, Chuba, and a lot of his teammates have a similar haul - but all silver thanks to the core of St. Francis's players. Is this the year the Sherwood Park core finally breaks through the Cowboys/Browns wall, or will the traditional laden Browns powerhouse complete the sweep? We'll find out Saturday.

TIER II Provincial Final #2 Foothills Falcons at #1 St. Josephs Celtics Fri. Nov. 25 – 7:00 p.m., Hellard Field at Shouldice Park (Calgary)

The feature game on Friday night at the Alberta Bowl will showcase a rematch from last year's Tier II Title Game. Rematches are usually fun, but this one comes with a particular twist in that last year's game wasn't even close. 69-15 was the final tally last year as the Falcons' scored early and often blowing the Celtics right off the field. The funny thing was that 2015 was supposed to be the high-water mark for both teams as they both graduated some generationally top level talent after that game and yet here they find themselves again facing each other in the Final again. That speaks volumes to the strength of the programs. The Celtics in recent years have always made it a practice of barn storming all over the province in search of games to sharpen their sword beyond the Mighty Peace League where everyone of their league opponents comes from a lower Tier. This has come a great cost and time as the one Achilles Heel that always haunts them is the distance they have to travel from remote Grande Prairie. Still, you can't argue the results, with the Celtics making their third straight appearance in the Alberta Bowl, having won it all in 2014 and the game they'd sooner forget from 2015. A strong line on both sides of the ball anchored by Team Alberta standouts Austin Dunbar, Brennan Alde and Marshall Tunke may control things for them on Friday. Both of their Provincial games so far have been low scoring with tight wins over #5 Austin O'Brien and #7 Lloydminster to get to this point.

On the other side of the ball is another study in consistency. Since 2000, the Falcons have been the most prolific attendee in the Alberta Bowl from the South side of the draw with 2016 being their 8th trip winning five Championships along the way. Their travel log may not match the Celtics in distance but they too rely heavily on exhibition games as their Big Rock Schedule is only so long being a four-team league. Defence is the name of the game with the Falcons this year, with standout linebackers Keaton Goosen and Tyler Goings the primary reason they were able to overcome the tough #3 Medicine Hat Mohawks and #4 Hunting Hills Lightning on their way to the Big Dance. The opened the year with two losses but since then have reeled off nine straight wins and are looking to add trophy #6 to the trophy case in the hallways at Foothills this Friday.

Death, taxes and a Provincial Final appearance by the Cochrane Cobras. Pretty much life's guarantees. Well, almost when it comes to Cobras. Since the readjustment in Tier sizes in 1999 which firmly placed Cochrane in Tier III, the Cobras have been in this game 11 times, winning 9 of them. And it's not just that they win the game, it's the margins by which they do. When they win, they win big. Their average margin of victory in those 9 wins is almost five touchdowns (33.4) and that includes their only nail biter, a 7-5 win over Sylvan Lake in 2008.

Their opponent knows this only too well, having been the victim of just such an experience last year, as the Holy Rosary Raiders took it on the chin 55-0 at the hands of the Cobras in the 2015 Alberta. Undaunted they have risen to the challenge and have been more dominant than ever in the Wheatland League this year, going undefeated and winning their third straight league championship. As well, their average margin of victory in the post season (including League and Provincial playoffs) has been 36.8. If not now, when?

This game can also be looked at as the Battle of the Gun Slingers, as it features the only time both quarterbacks have come from the previous year's Team Alberta. Cochrane's Tae Gordon and Holy Rosary's Tommy Yanchuck were the two QB's on last summer's Team Alberta that competed in the Football Canada Cup and finished 4th. Both are classic QB types with Yanchuk more in the mould of drop back specialist Tom Brady while Gordon's scrambling and ability to extend plays brings back memories of Doug Flutie. More of the same for Cochrane this Saturday or will the Raiders erase last year's memory and win their first Tier III title?




