A tribute to Leeanne Reid of La Crete Public School

I have coached Junior "A" girl's basketball for the last six years at Fairview High School in Fairview Alberta. I have two daughters that I have coached through

to the senior high level.

On March 5, 2005 I was watching the Fairview senior girls play in the zone playoffs in Valleyview. Fairview's last game was against La Crete. During the game I was

told that one of the girls on the La Crete team was undergoing chemotherapy for cancer. I was amazed to watch how this player played the game with so much determination. After the game I thought about her and what she was going through. I decided that it would be important to recognize her for the spirit that she demonstrated. I write

this article in order to celebrate the spirit of Leeanne Reid from La Crete. While I watched Leeanne on the court I could not help but admire her

tenacity. She was giving everything she had for her team and her school. It is important that we the basketball community come together through this article in order to celebrate her spirit.

Robin Webster, who coached the Fairview High School Junior "A" girls basketball team before I came along said to me, "you are

going to find out that the game of basketball is about everything but the game of basketball." I wasn't sure

what Robin meant at the time but because of the experience that I had at that game I now under-



stand what Robin was getting at. Here was a player who had risen above her own situation in order to support her team. In my mind this is what the spirit of the game is all about. As individuals and as a team we find the strength to rise above the most desperate of situations.

Every year I always tell people that when I coach my goal is to always leave the girls a little bit better off than when I got them. I always find that by the end of the year that the girls have left me much better off than when they got me. Coaching and playing basketball has been a lifetime of learning for me. I have very strong feelings for the game and the people who play.

By watching and feeling Leeanne's struggle to overcome her cancer I can very clearly state that she has left us all much better off then we were before. Thanks for showing us how to rise to the occasion both in your

> battle with cancer and in your indelible spirit for the game of basketball.

Attention Athletic Directors

Is someone new taking over the athletic director role in your school for 2005/06? If so, please take a few minutes to prepare some tips for the new person so they are not in the dark about ASAA policies and deadlines come September. And even if you're not leaving, here's a list of things that are good to do in the new school year.



- 1. Make a note of your ExNet username and password and keep it handy or leave it for your replacement.
- 2. Update the school information section in ExNet, particularly the email address section, to ensure ASAA reminders reach your school.
- 3. Watch for the September mailing. It will have the new handbook, accommodation guide and calendar.
- 4. Post the ASAA calendar and refer to it often. All registration deadlines are clearly marked so your school can avoid late registration fees.
- 5. Print and refer to the ExNet help guide for registration problems.
- 6. Familiarize yourself with the ASAA tranfer policy.
- 7. Know who your zone secretary is and don't be shy--ask them about zone policies.
- 8. Attend your zone meetings whenever possible.
- 9. Watch for the new ASAA e-newsletter.
- 10. Call or email the ASAA office anytime you need help!

Marwayne Coach and Two Student Athletes Enjoy Leadership Camp

The ASAA had the opportunity through grant funding to send a coach and two athletes to a coach/captain leadership retreat in North Carolina in April. The retreat, hosted by the North Carolina High School Athletic Association (NCHSAA), was a twoday event aimed at defining leadership skills of captains; identifying key issues affecting student athletes; understanding that team captains can influence others within the school; and learning to communicate effectively with peers and adults. The goal of the retreat was for each school group to develop an action plan to bring student leadership intitiatives into the schools.

Eileen Hines, the girls basketball coach at Marwayne Jubilee and last year's ASAA Most Sportsmanlike Coach award recipient, was asked to attend the retreat along with two of her grade eleven student athletes and Lynda Bourak, a member of the ASAA staff. Eileen chose to bring Jill Wheat and Ashley Cote to the retreat and the girls had a great time. Being the only Canadians in the crowd, Jill and Ashley were affectionately known as "Canada" and were welcomed to participate in all activities by their North Carolina peers. Though the issues and perspectives of the American student athletes were sometimes different

from ones faced by students in Alberta, the discussions around developing leadership skills and taking a stand on issues in the schools were appropriate for everyone.

The ASAA is now planning to develop and host a leadership retreat of its own sometime in the future. The ideas that were shared and the methods learned at the retreat will help the ASAA in the development process.

We look forward to working on this initiative in the coming months and making the opportunity available to more of our member schools.
